Moratorium of Utilities (Requirements for North Carolina)..212-7000

Moratorium is a prohibition against disconnecting service to residential customers (during a designated time period) who meet eligibility requirements established by the North Carolina Utilities Commission

North Carolina Moratorium Period - November 1 through March 31 - 5 month

To qualify annually under the moratorium provision, a customer must establish ALL of the following: (1) Someone in the customer's household must be either handicapped, elderly (65 or older), or both. (2)Customer cannot pay his/ her account in full, nor installments to bring the account into balance within 6 months. (3)The county Department of Social Services which administers the ENERGY CRISIS ASSISTANCE PROGRAM has certified that the household is eligible to receive such assistance, regardless of availability of funds. (DSS will present the customer with a "Certification Utilities Moratorium" to be mailed /faxed to Duke Energy Progress, 9700 David Taylor Drive, Charlotte, NC 28262-2363, if eligibility is met.)

White Flag Initiative: White Flag (WF) is a coordinated effort among area shelters to provide emergency overflow shelter to homeless persons in the event of severe weather conditions. In extremely cold or extremely hot

The Wake County IDPP Department is only responsible for inspecting homes within the unincorporated areas of the county.

ARE YOU READY TO RENT?

Before you begin your housing search, review the following steps for helpful housing hints.

FIRST: Determine what you can afford and order your credit report. According to HUD, Affordable means:

- > A family should not spend more than 30% of their gross income for rent and utilities combined.
- > A family who is spending more than 50% of their gross income on housing is in serious crisis and is at a high risk for homelessness.

Multiply your monthly income by .30 to determine the maximum rent and utility you should pay.

Know what's on your credit report. Take the time to improve your rating before you apply for housing.

SECOND: Determine your Move-In Costs and SAVE

Note: These are only estimates. Your actual move-in costs may be more or less than \$1,280.

Deposit amounts can be very high or low and the amount depends on your credit rating, your previous pay history with the utility company and the previous utility history at the new home in which you plan to move. If you are moving, call the utility company well before you move to get an idea of what your deposit may be.

Tips:

Truck Rentals may be cheaper during the week. Call around to get the best rates.

Get family and friends to help you move instead of renting a truck.

THIRD: Locate Housing

Here are a few things to consider when choosing a home:

Do I NEED/WANT a home close to my employer to reduce gas cost and transportation fees?

Do I NEED/WANT a home in close proximity to my child's school?

Do I NEED/WANT a luxury unit with a high rent or can a take a smaller unit with a lower rent and use the money I save to pay off bills and build my emergency savings account?

TIPS:

- $\sqrt{10}$ Pay your rent on the 1st of the month. Your rent is the most important payment and usually the largest. Make paying your rent on time a priority always pay it first.
- \checkmark Create a monthly budget and use it to plan how you'll spend your money.
- \checkmark Rental agreements should be in writing. Read your lease agreement and ask questions if you don't understand the terms.
- \checkmark Contact your landlord as soon as you know you'll have problems with paying your rent on time. Some landlords may work with you if you've paid your rent on time in the past and are in good standing with the landlord.

FAIR HOUSING IS THE LAW

The Fair Housing Act prohibits discrimination in housing because of:

- Race or color
- National origin
- Religion
- Sex
- Family Status (including children under the age of 18 living with parents or legal custodians; pregnant women and people securing custody of children under 18)
- Handicap

What Housing Is Covered?

The Fair Housing Act covers most housing. In some circumstances, the Act exempts owner-occupied building with no more than four units, singlefamily housing sold or rented without the use of a broker and housing operated by organizations and private clubs that limit occupancy to members.

What is Prohibited?

In the Sale and Rental of Housing: No one may take any of the following actions based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, familial status or handicap:

- Refuse to rent or sell housing
- Refuse to negotiate for housing
- Make housing unavailable
- Deny a dwelling
- Set different terms, conditions or privileges for sale or rental of a dwelling
- Provide different housing services or facilities
- Falsely deny that housing is available for inspection, sale or rental
- For profit, persuade owners to sell or rent (blockbusting)
- Deny anyone access to or membership in a facility or service (such as a multiple listing service) related to the sale or rental of housing.

Protections For People With Disabilities

- People with handicaps are to be treated the same as other people.
- Accommodations should be made for handicapped person that are not required for others:
 - Reasonable changes or exceptions to rules may be necessary. Example: A landlord must make an exception to a "no-pets" policy to allow a tenant who is sight –impaired to live with his/her seeing eye dog.
 - Handicapped tenants must be allowed to make reasonable changes to properties if they are necessary to allow the tenants to use the property. The landlord's duty is to permit the changes, NOT pay for them. Example: A landlord must allow a handicapped tenant to install a wheelchair ramp, but is not obligated to pay for it.
- Apartment buildings with four or more units built after March 12, 1991 must be accessible to the physically handicapped.

Active partnership with HUD approved housing counseling agencies, legal assistance organizations, mortgage servicers and community organizations to assist home owners to avoid foreclosure

If you have received a 45-day pre-foreclosure notice, the State Home Foreclosure Prevention Project (SHFPP) offers free help, including housing counseling, access to legal services if your income is low, and assistance working with your servicer<u>. You are eligible for assistance</u> whatever the cause of your pending foreclosure – the reason does not need to be related to your employment. There are no credit restrictions for this help. The SHFPP coordinates HUD-approved housing counseling agencies, state and federal agencies, legal assistance organizations, mortgage servicers and community organizations to provide the resources you need to avoid foreclosure. The program was created by the General Assembly in 2008 and is administered by the North Carolina Housing Finance Agency, a self-supporting public agency.
